- 3. Changes in the combat strength of forces detailed to the Unified Armed Forces in conjunction with the reduction in troops.
- 4. Incorporating the German Democratic Republic's Armed Forces into the Unified Armed Forces.
- 5. Creation of the following auxiliary bodies within the Political Consultative Committee:a) A Standing Commission to develop recommendations on foreign policy issues;b) A Joint Secretariat.
- III. To conduct the regular open meeting of the Political Consultative Committee in Prague on January 27-28 with the following agenda:
- 1. Joint Declaration on Foreign Policy Issues by the Warsaw Treaty Member-States.
- 2. Text of the communiqué on the Political Consultative Committee's decisions (a draft communiqué is attached below).
